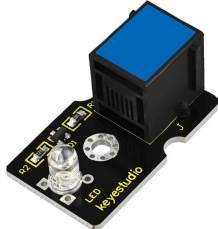
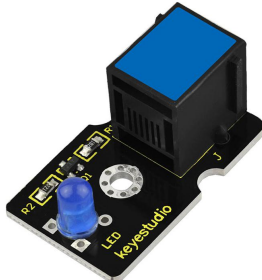
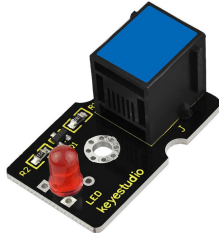

This kit contains everything you need to complete the project. These projects will teach you how to control and read external sensors and 1602 displays, control 8*8 dot matrix, etc.

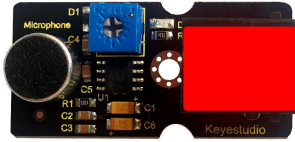

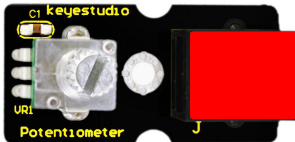


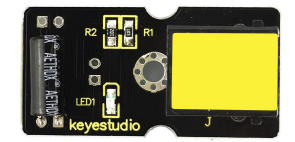
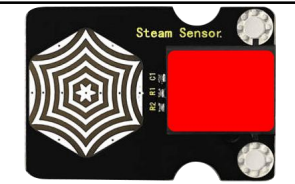
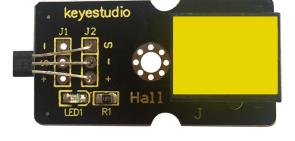

3.Keyestudio EASY plug Control Board V2.0



The processor used in keyestudio EASY plug control board V2.0 is ATmega328.

It has 5 single Digital ports labeled D5 to D9 (of which 3 can be used as PWM outputs), 1 dual-digital interface (D3-D4), 4 analog inputs (A0-A3), a Joystick interface (D2-A6-A7), a SPI communication, a serial port communication and an IIC communication interface. Also with a USB connection, a power jack, two ICSP headers and a reset button. It breaks out the IO ports with RJ11 6P6C plug.

Simply connect it to a computer with a USB cable or power it via a DC jack to get started.

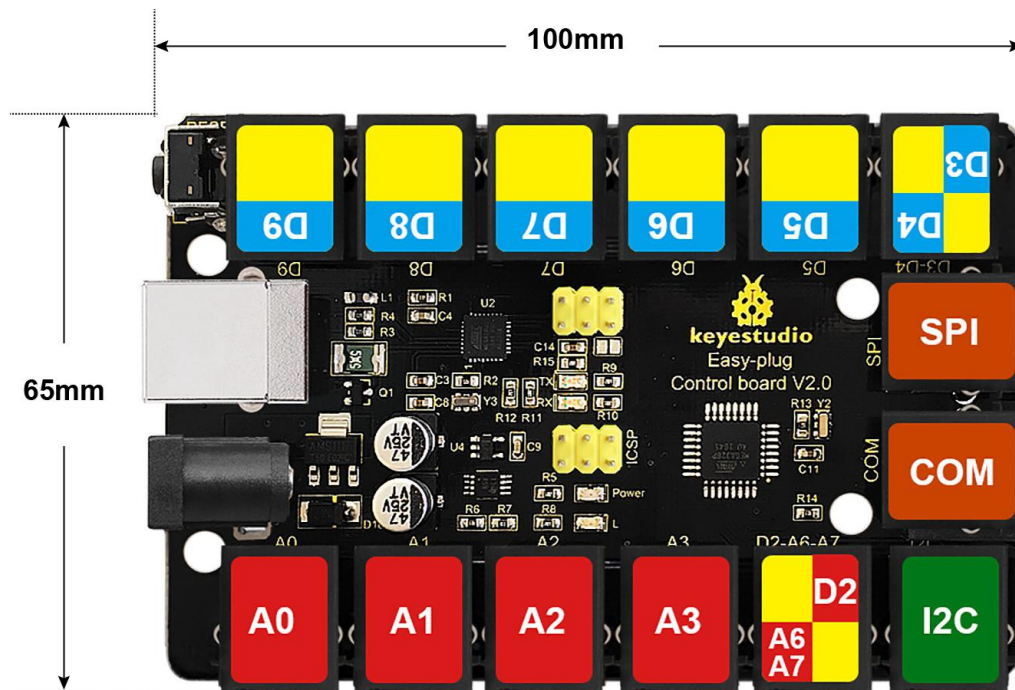
For convenience of wire connection, we simplify the pins GND and VCC into

each plug, so you only need one RJ11 6P6C connector wire to connect an external sensor or module, no need to separately connect the VCC and GND.

So don't worry that the wrong wiring will damage the external products.

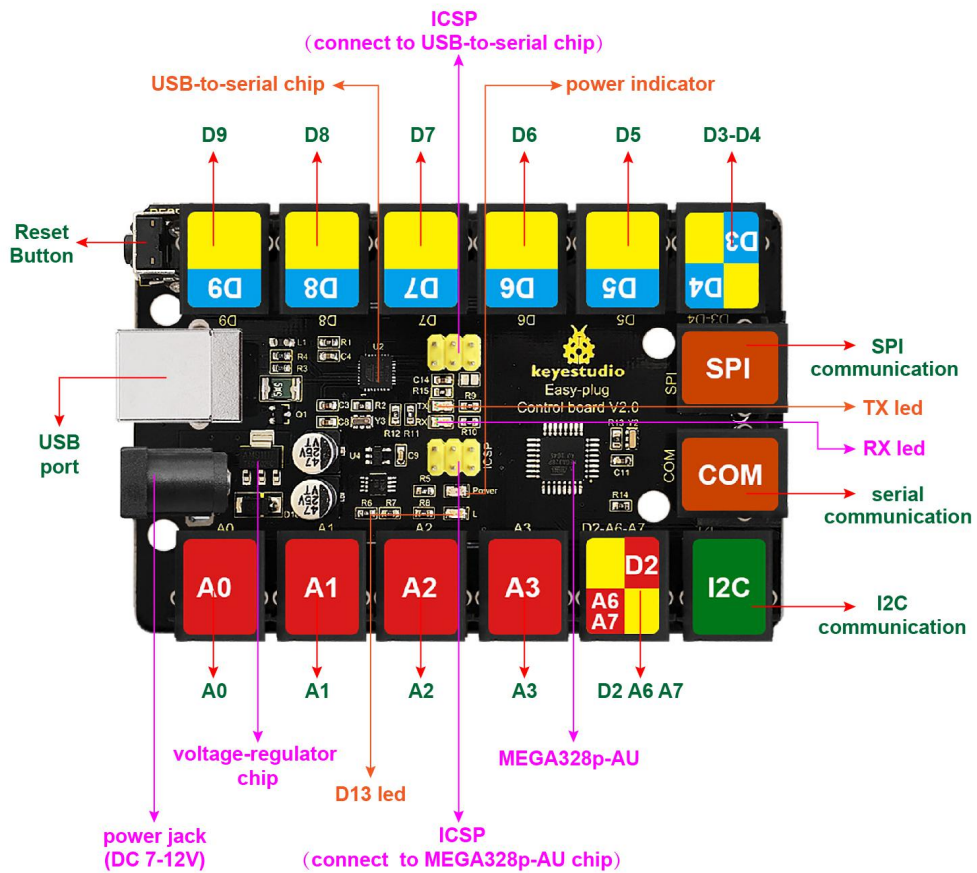

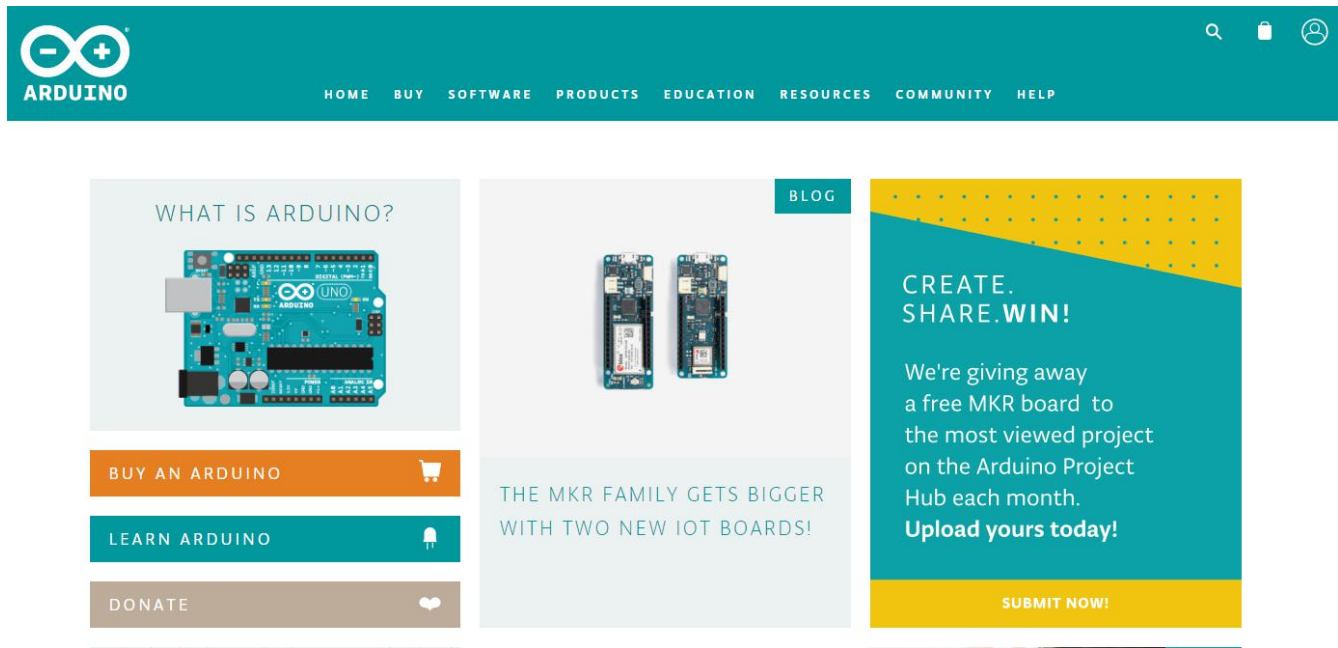
Step1| Download the Arduino IDE

When you get the board, first you should install the Arduino software and driver.

We usually use the Windows software Arduino 1.5.6 version. You can download it from the link below:

Then click the **SOFTWARE** on the browse bar, you will have two options ONLINE TOOLS and DOWNLOADS.



Click **DOWNLOADS**, it will appear the latest software version of ARDUINO 1.8.5 shown as below.

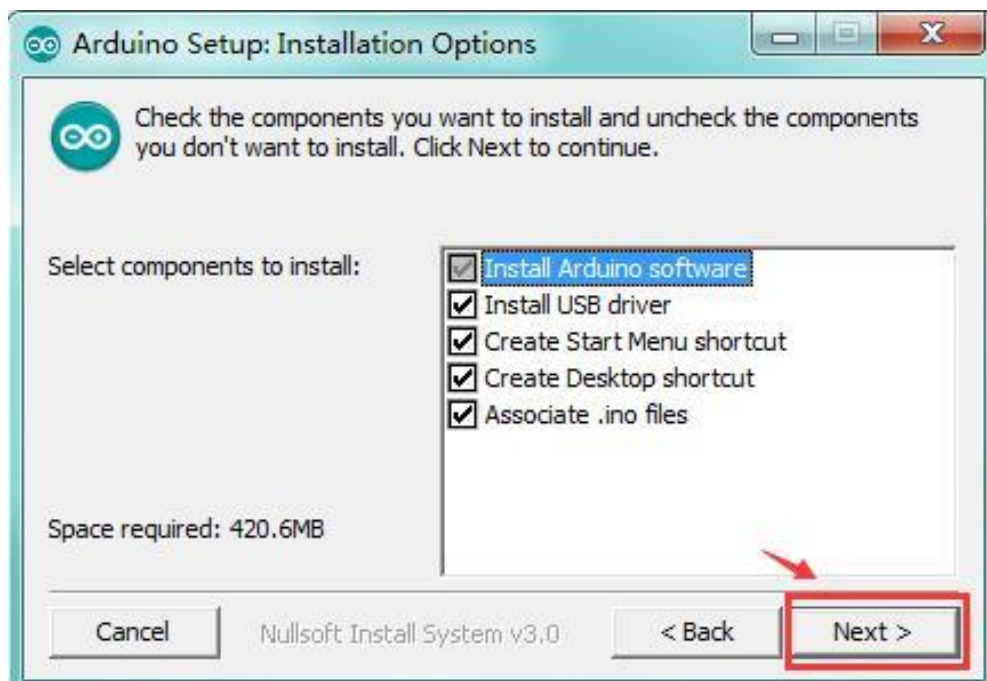
Click JUST DOWNLOAD, and when the ZIP file is downloaded well to your computer, you can directly unzip the file and click the icon of ARDUINO software to start it.

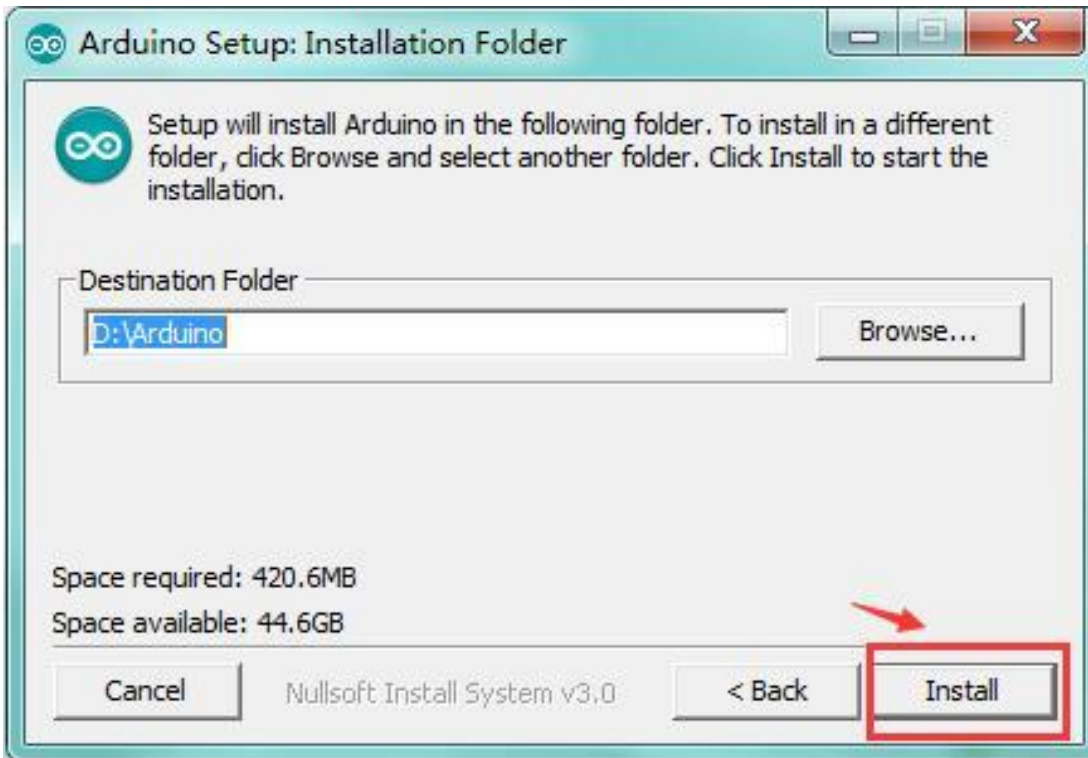

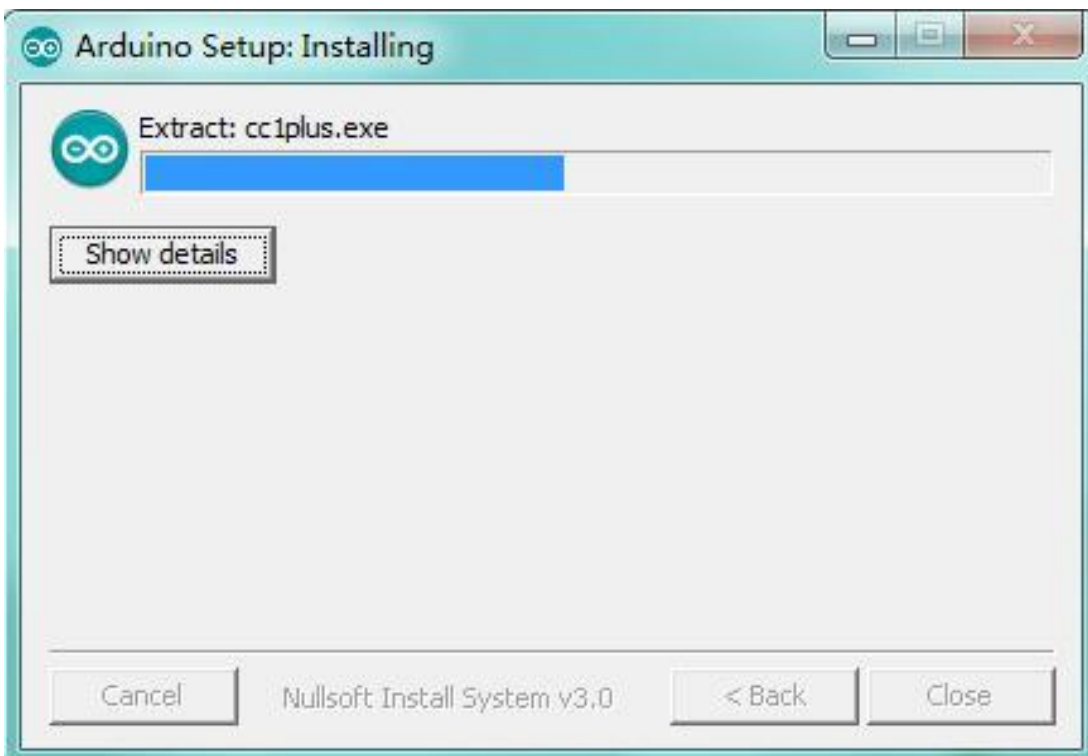

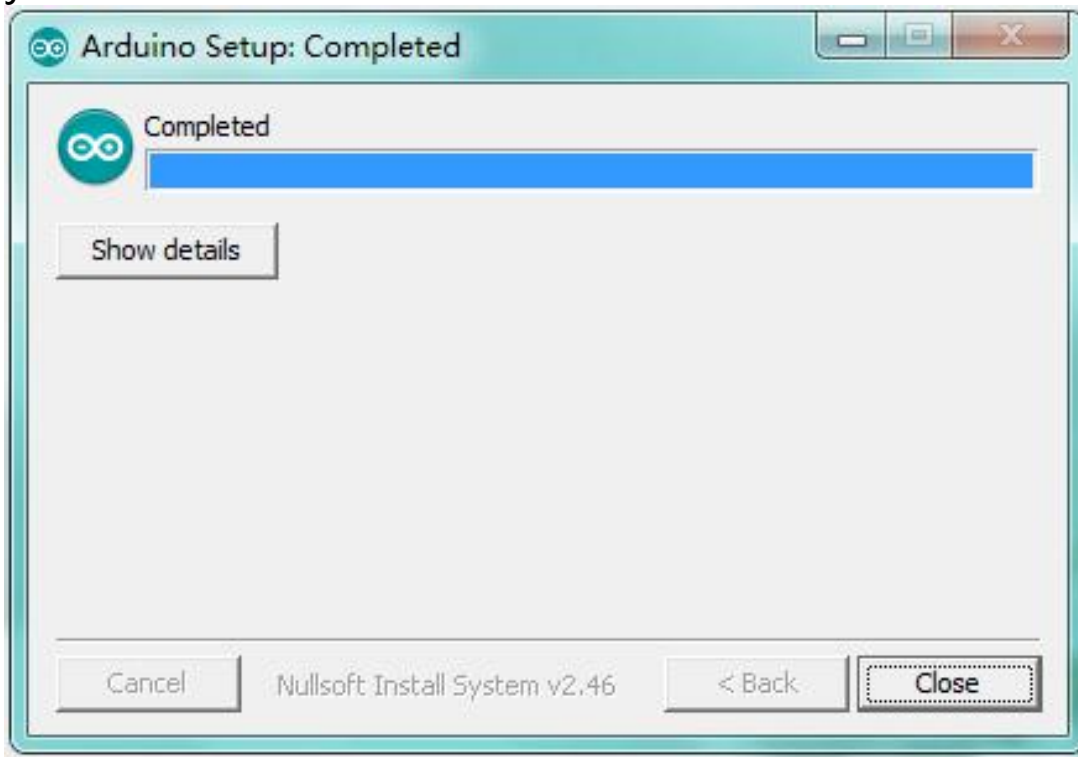
Click "Next" . Pop up the interface below.

Wait for the installing process, if appear the interface of Window Security, just continue to click Install to finish the installation.

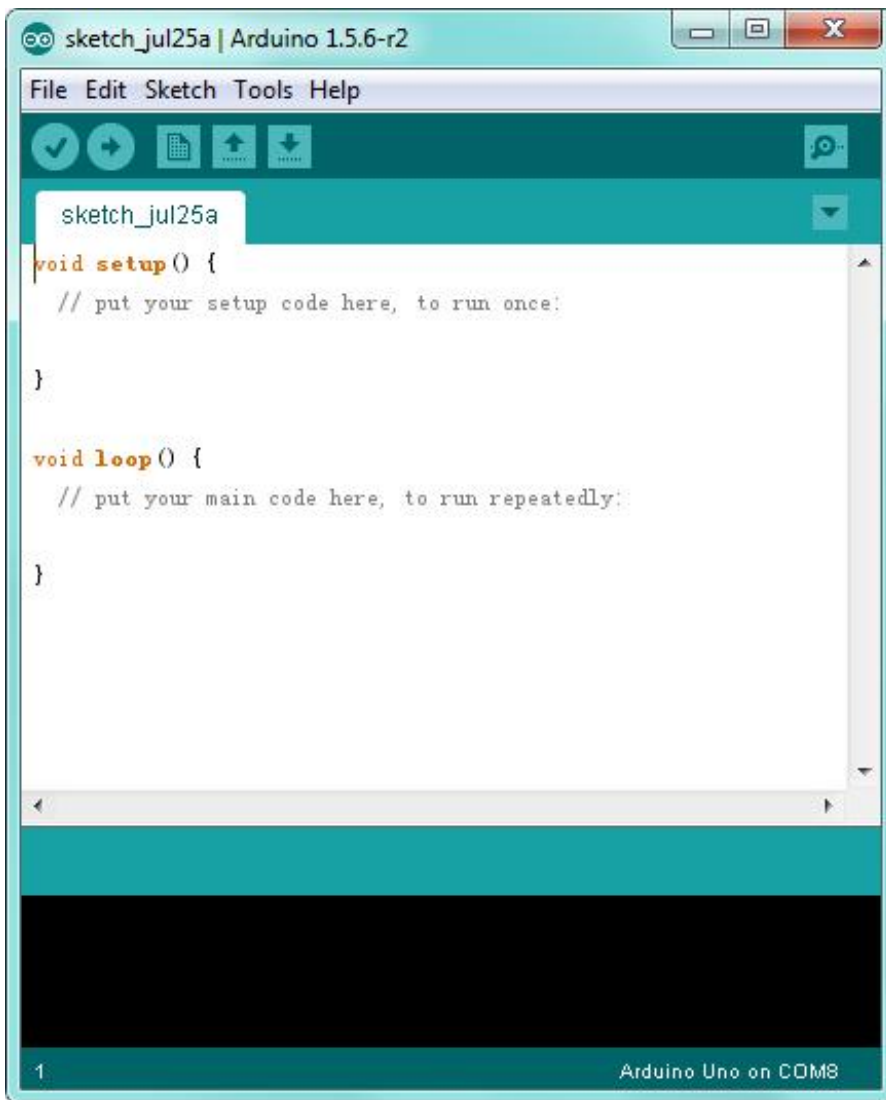


Introduction for Arduino IDE Toolbar:

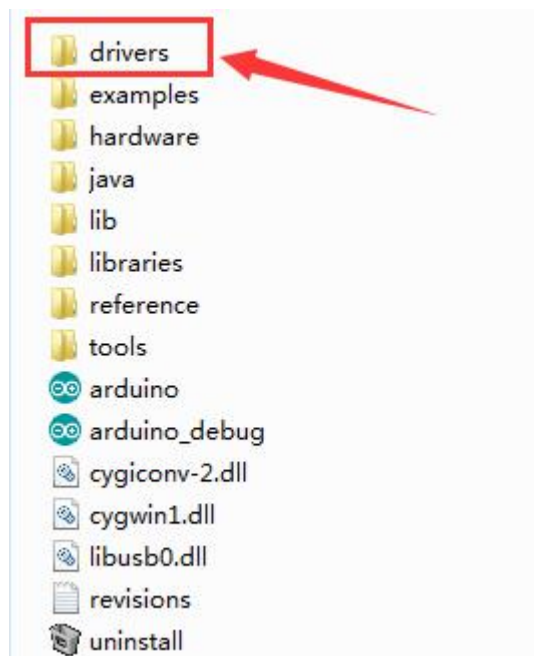

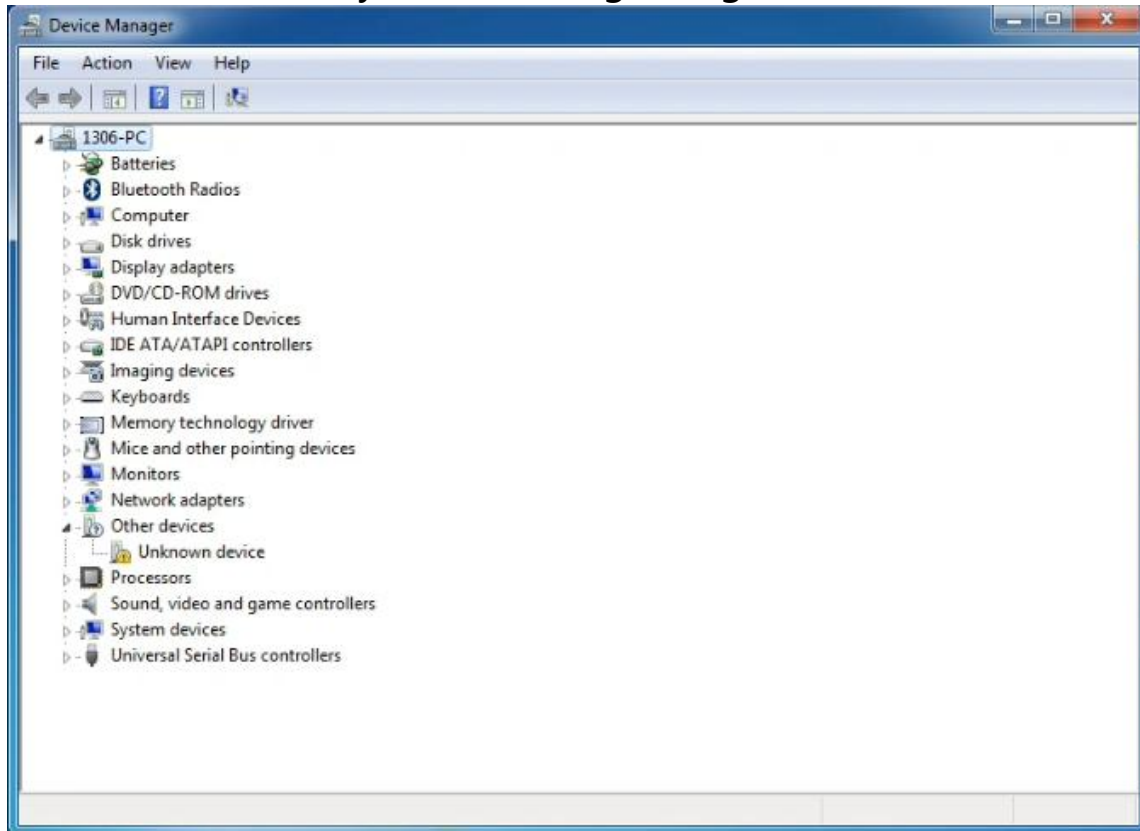
Installing the Driver:

Next, we will introduce the driver installation for the board. The driver installation may have slight differences in different computer systems. So in the following let's move on to the driver installation in the WIN 7 system. The Arduino folder contains both the Arduino program itself and the drivers that allow the Arduino to be connected to your computer by a USB cable. Before we launch the Arduino software, you are going to install the USB drivers.

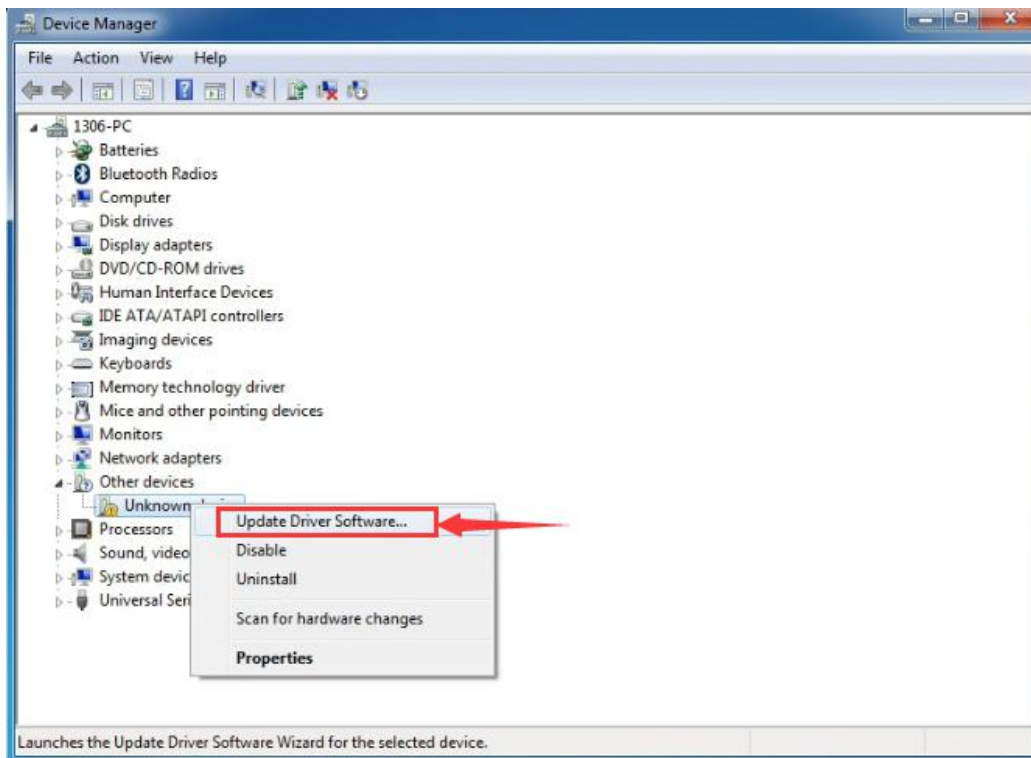


Plug one end of your USB cable into the Arduino and the other into a USB socket on your computer.

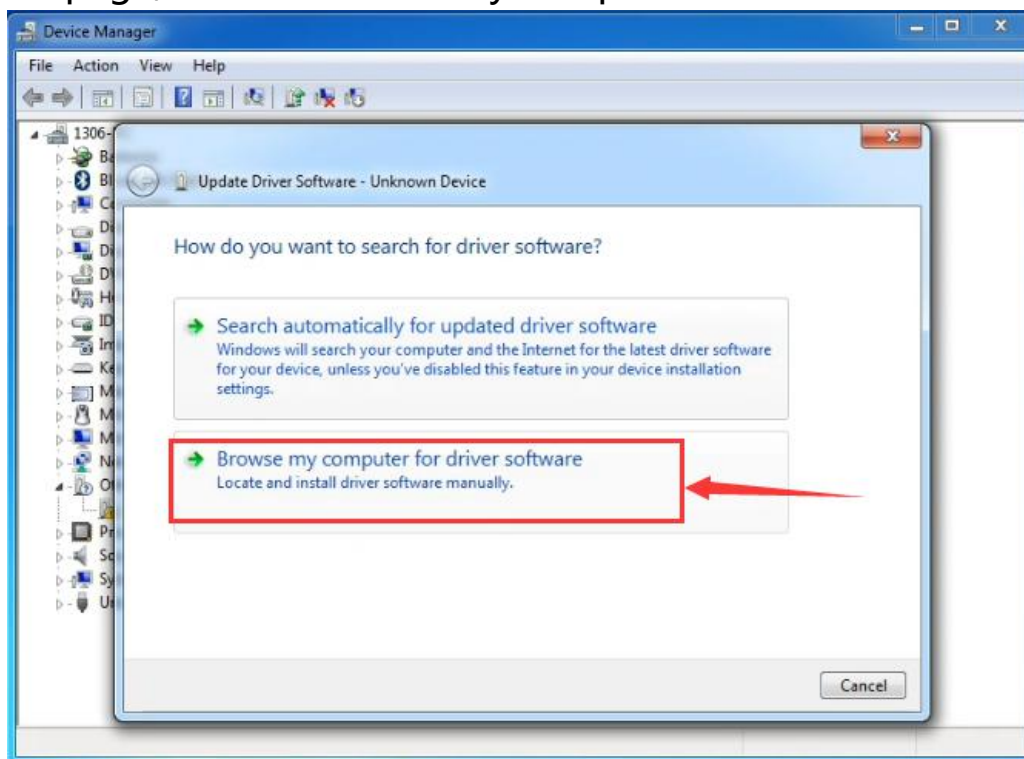
When you connect the board to your computer at the first time, right click the icon of your *"Computer"* —> *for "Properties"* —> *click the "Device manager"* , under *"Other Devices"* , you should see an icon for *"Unknown device"* with a little yellow warning triangle next to it.



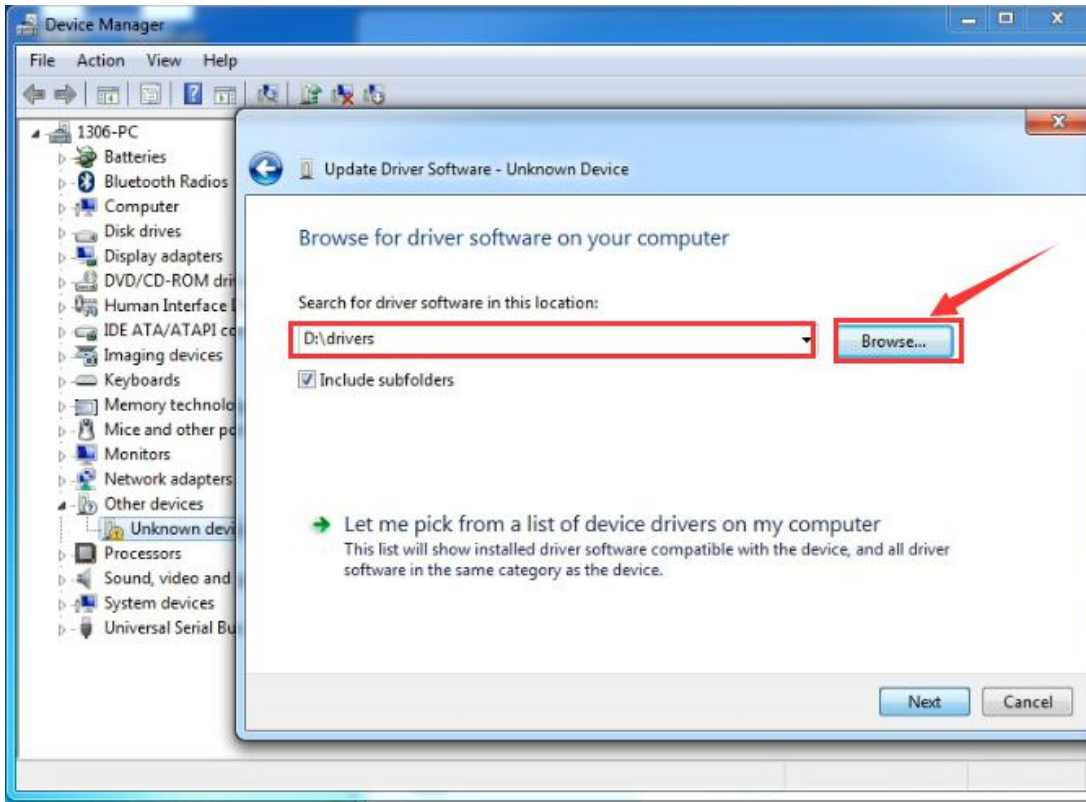
Then right-click on the device and select the top menu option (Update Driver Software...) shown as the figure below.



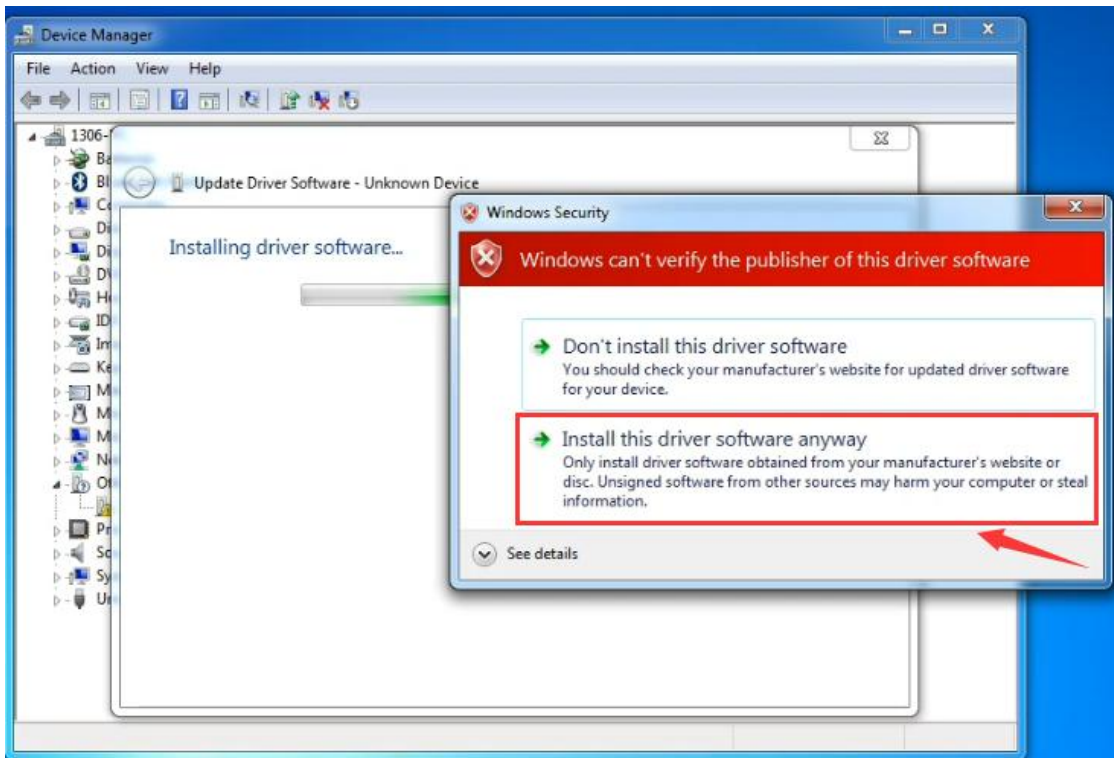
It will then be prompted to either “Search Automatically for updated driver software” or “Browse my computer for driver software” . Shown as below. In this page, select “Browse my computer for driver software” .



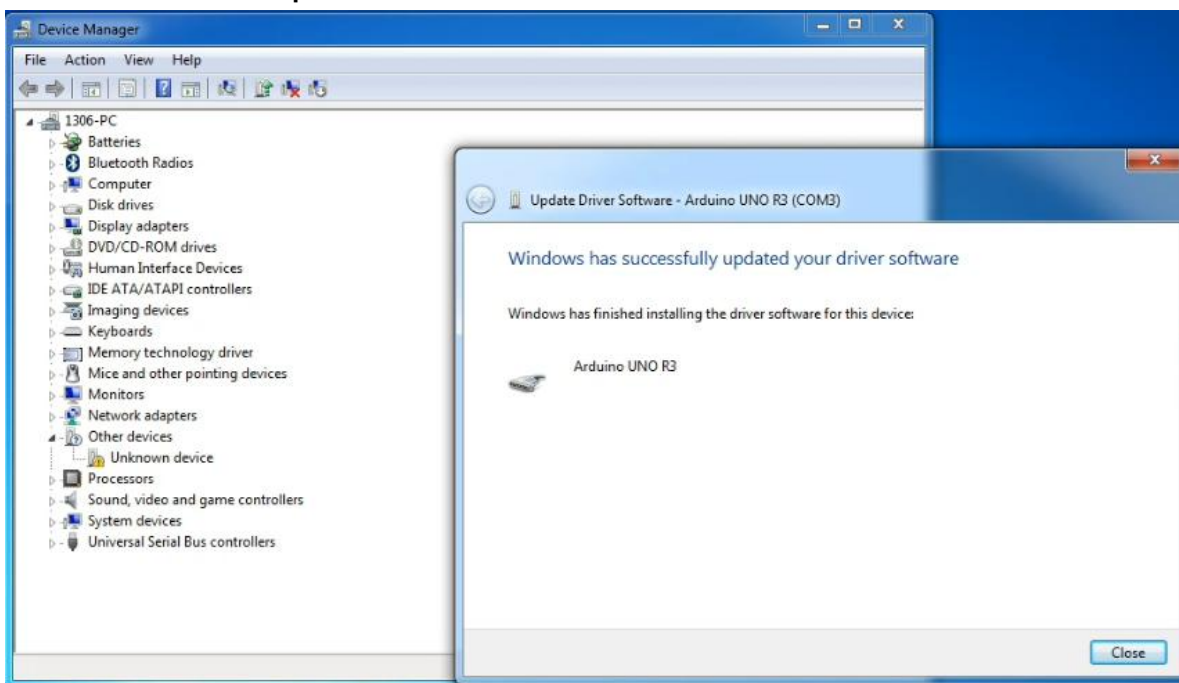
After that, select the option to browse and navigate to the “drivers” folder of Arduino installation.



Click “Next” and you may get a security warning; if so, allow the software to be installed. Shown as below.

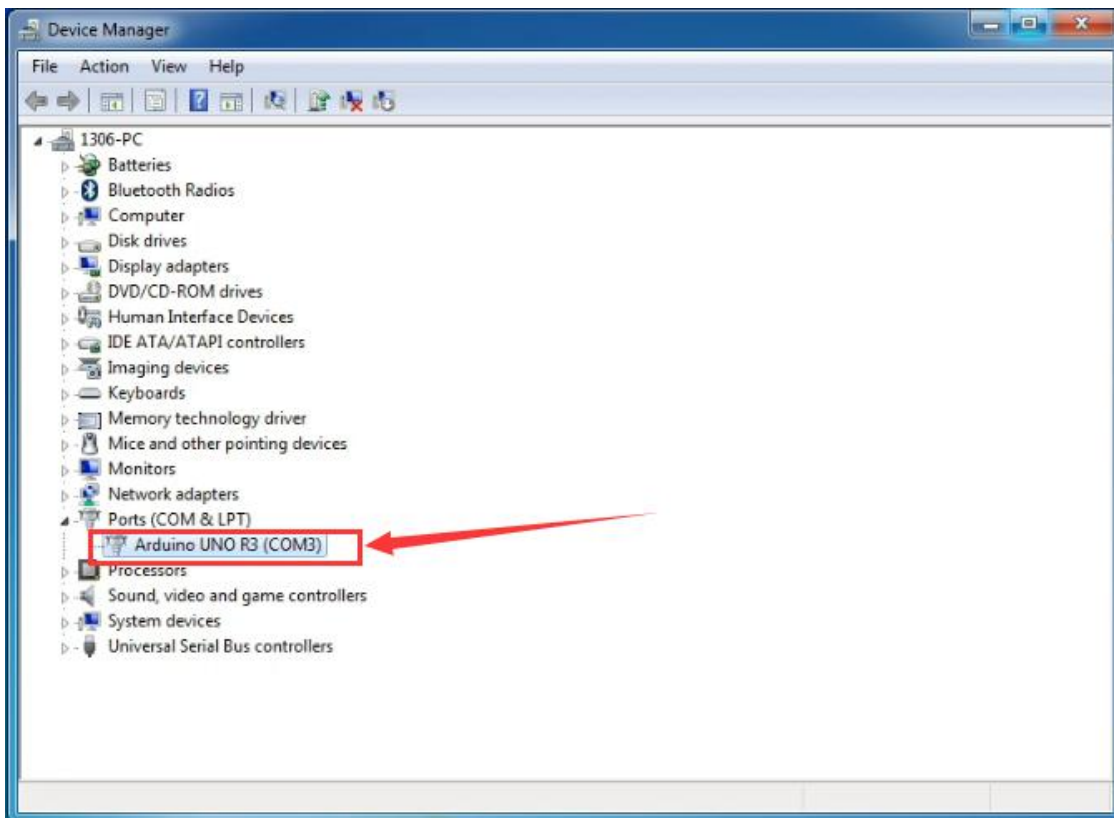


Installation completed, click "Close" .



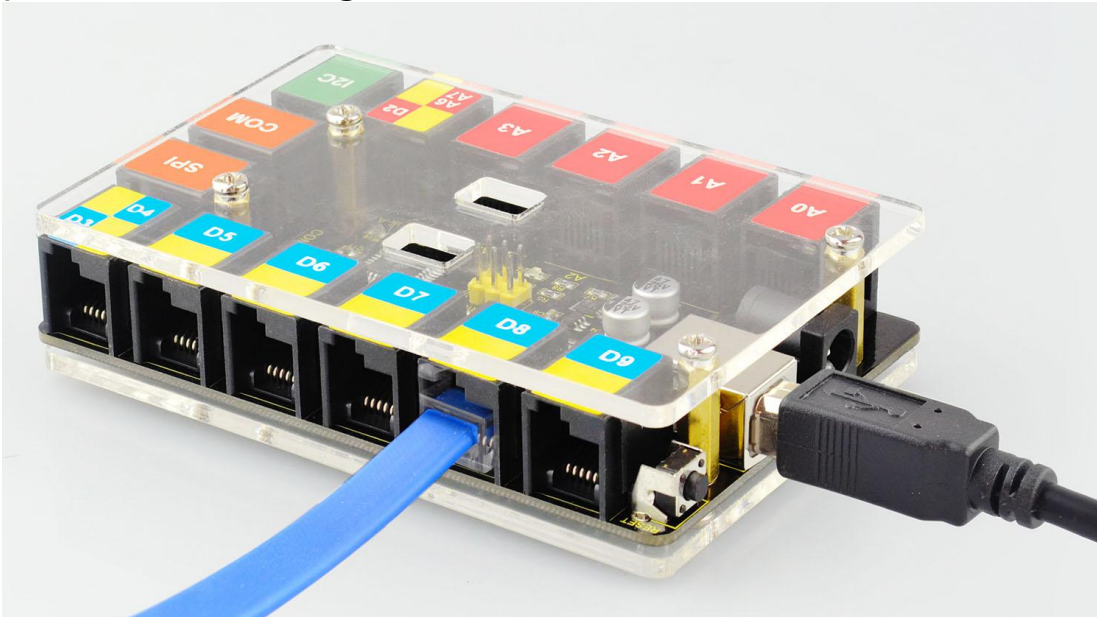
Up to now, the driver is installed well. Then you can right click "*Computer*" —> "*Properties*" —> "*Device manager*", you should see the device shown

below.



Step2| Connect the board

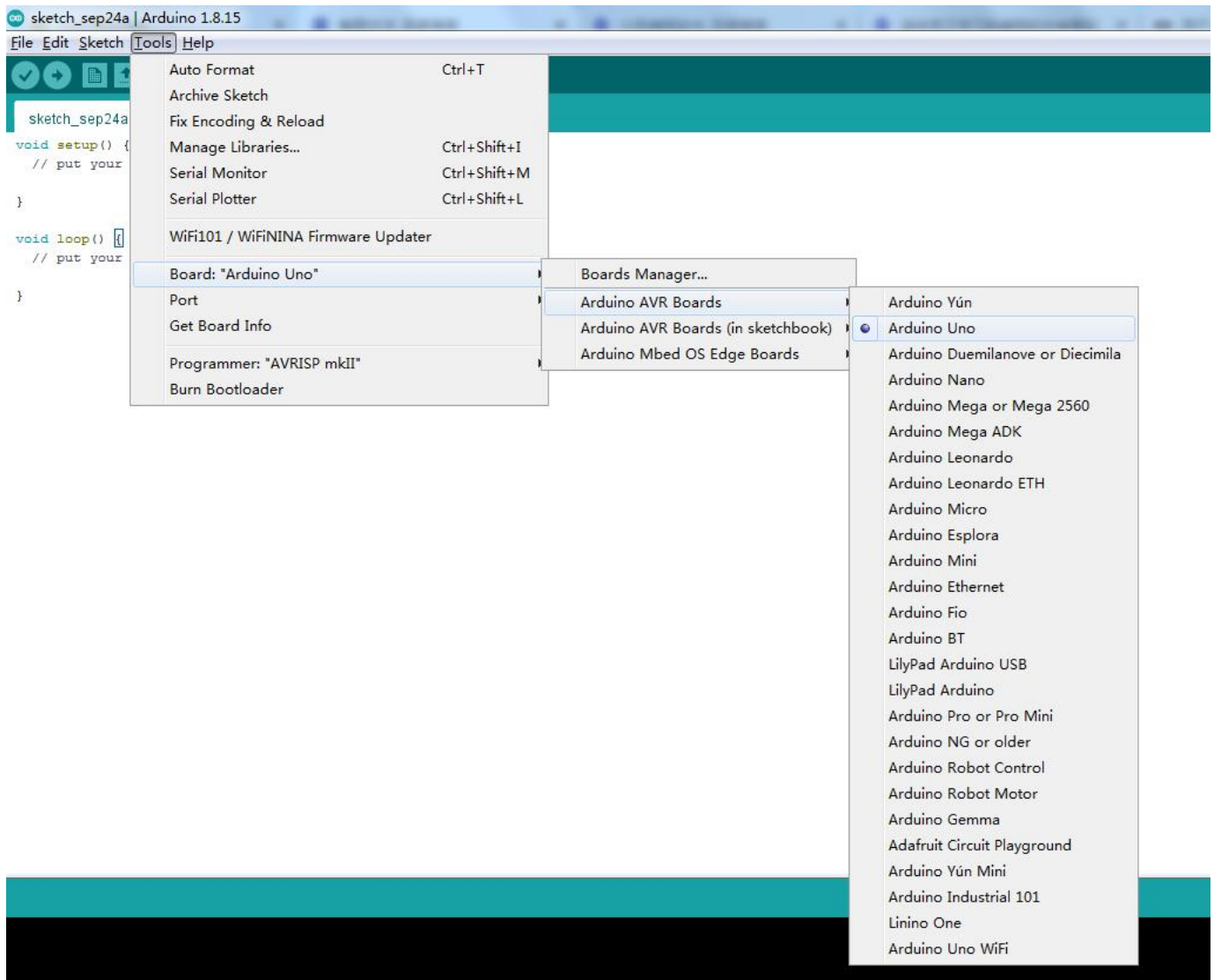
Connect the control board to your computer using the USB cable. The power LED should go on.



Step3| Select the Arduino Board

Open the Arduino IDE, you' ll need to click the "Tools" , then select the Board that corresponds to your Arduino.

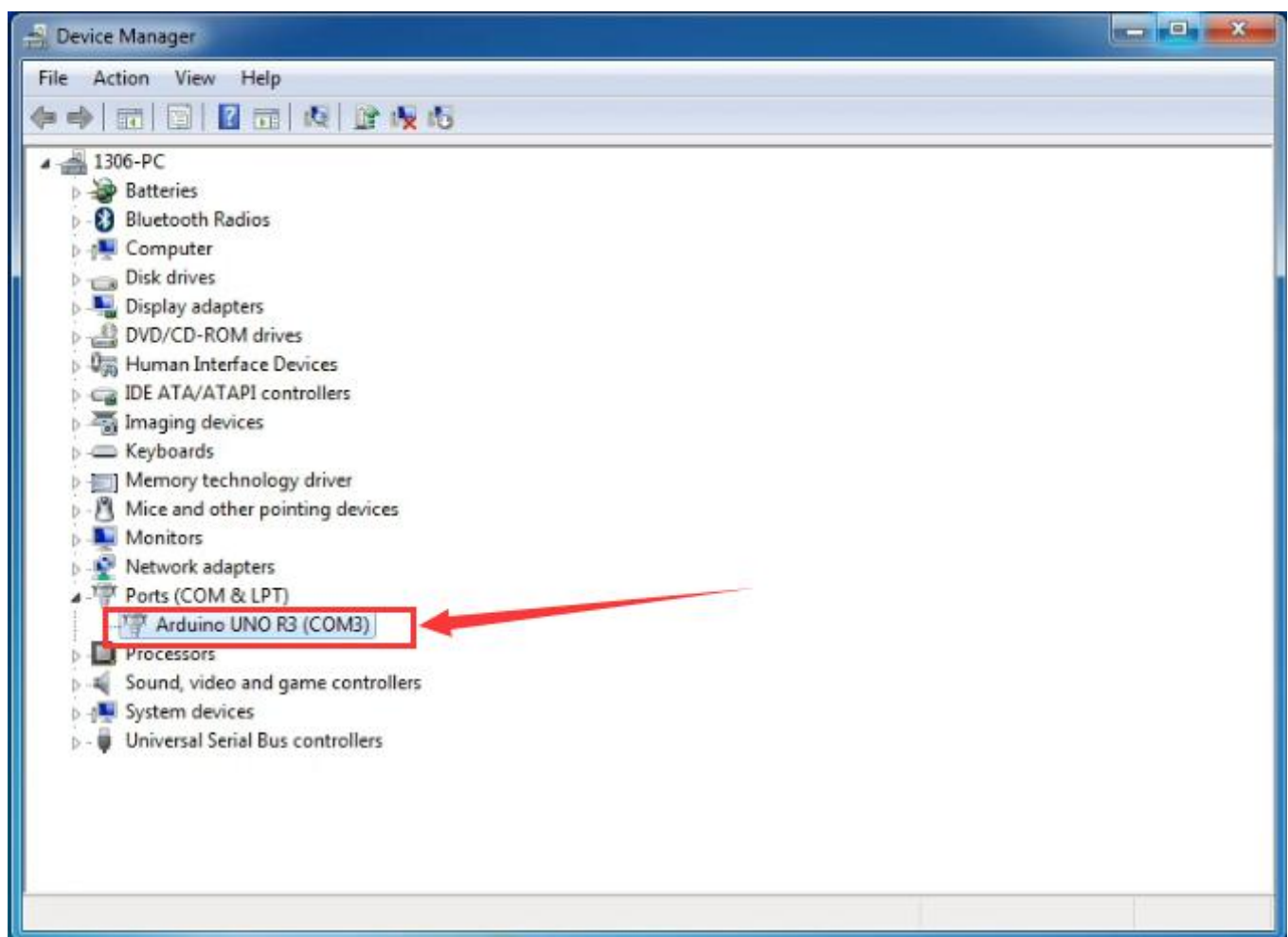


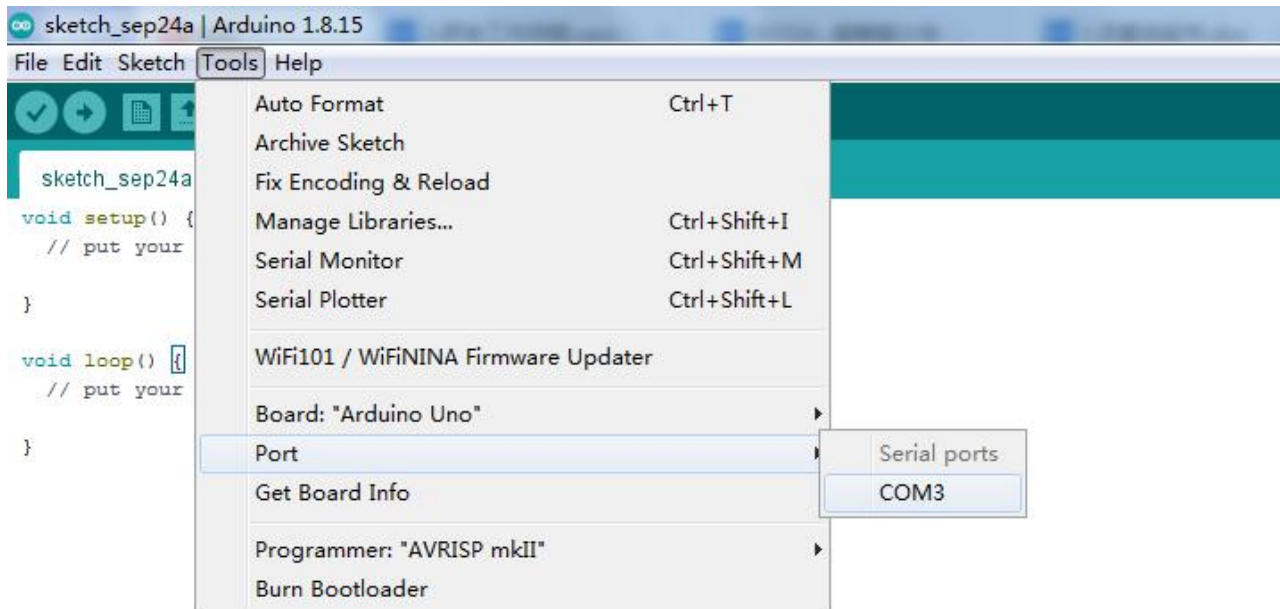


Step4| Select your serial port

Select the serial device of the Arduino board from the **Tools | Serial Port menu**.

Note: to avoid errors, the COM Port should keep the same as the Ports shown on Device Manager.





Step5| Upload the Code

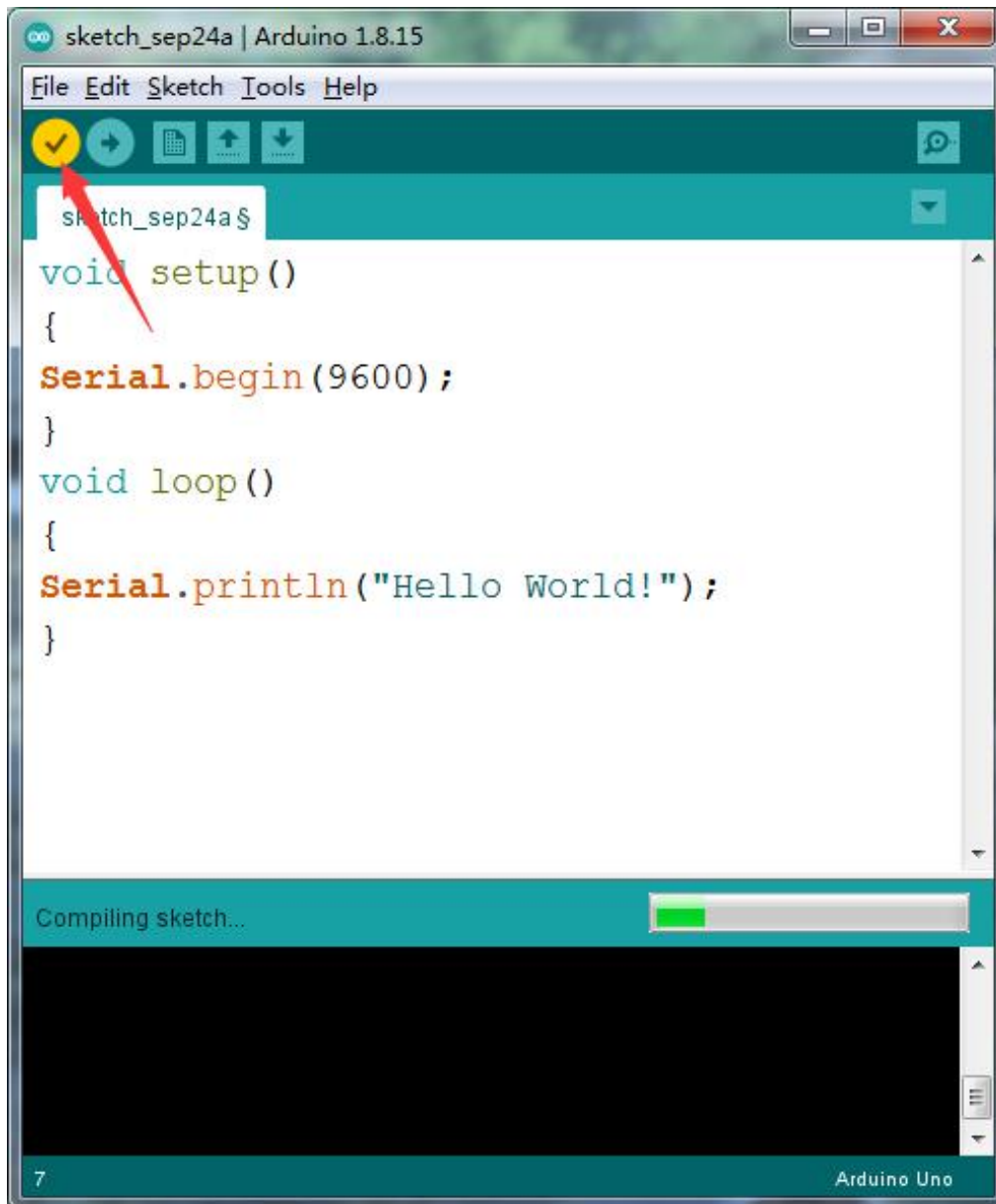

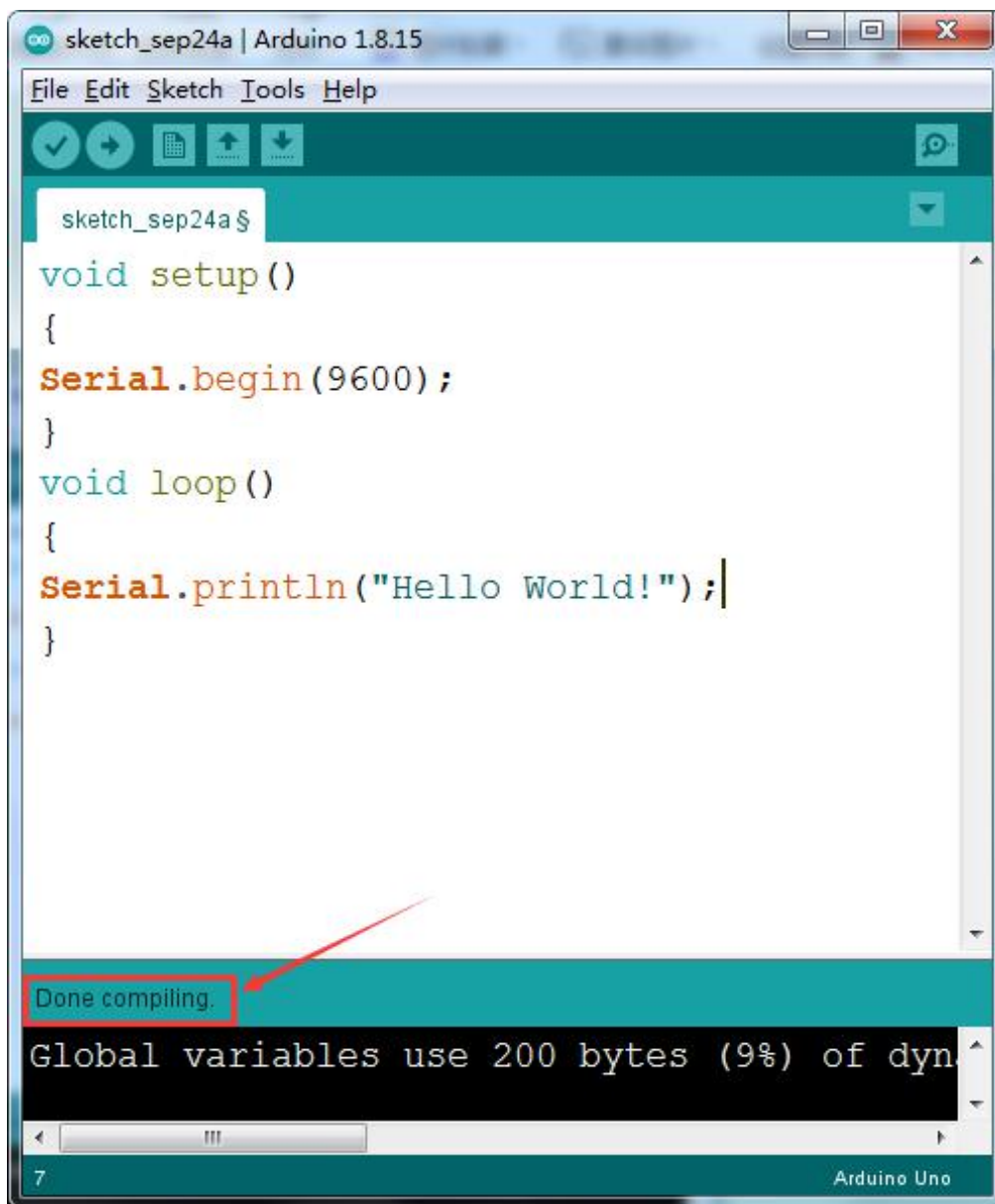

Then click verify button to check the errors. If compiling successfully, the message "Done compiling" will appear in the status bar.



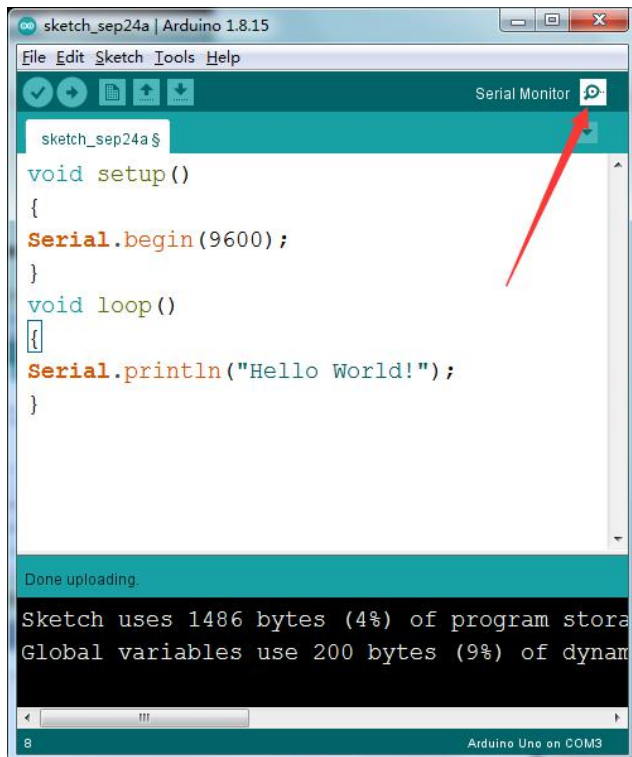


After that, click the "Upload" button to upload the code. Wait a few seconds - you should see the RX and TX leds on the board flashing. If the upload is successful, the message "Done uploading" will appear in the status bar.

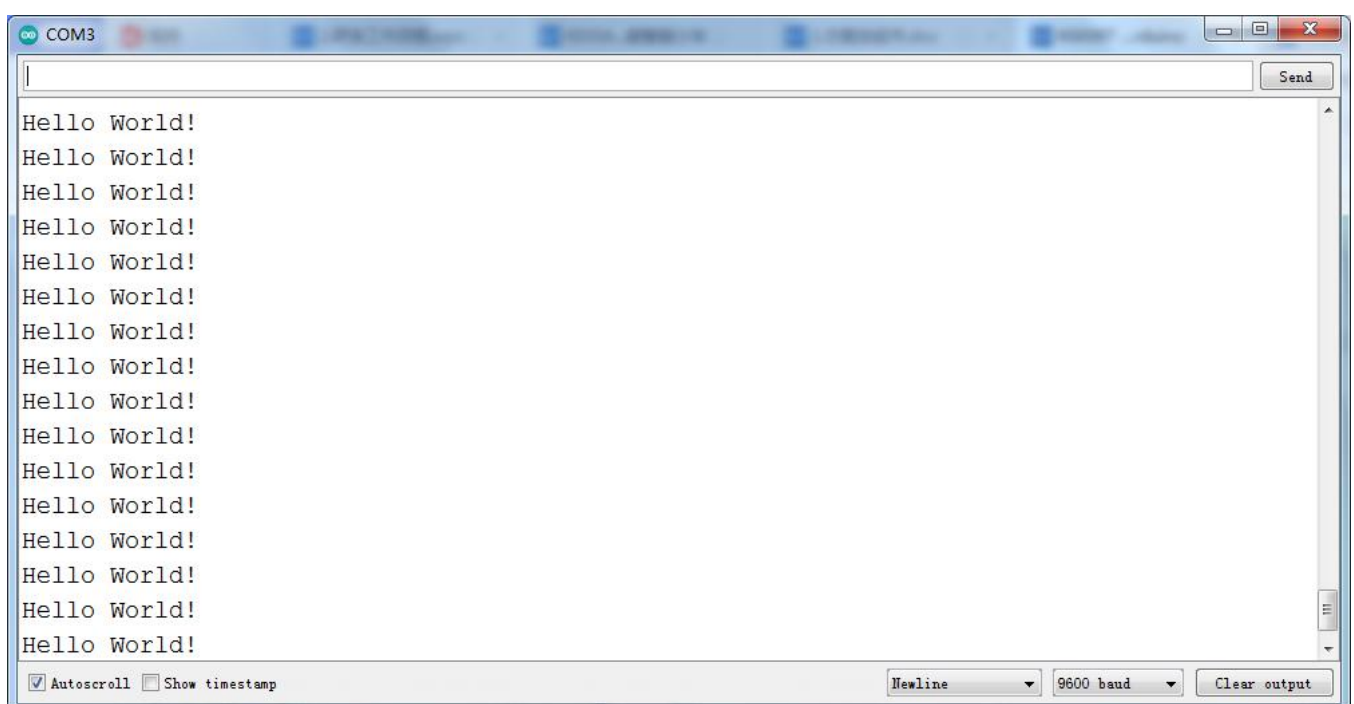


Step6|Open the Serial Monitor

After that, click the monitor button to open the serial monitor.



Then set the baud rate as 9600, "Hello World!" is showed on the monitor.

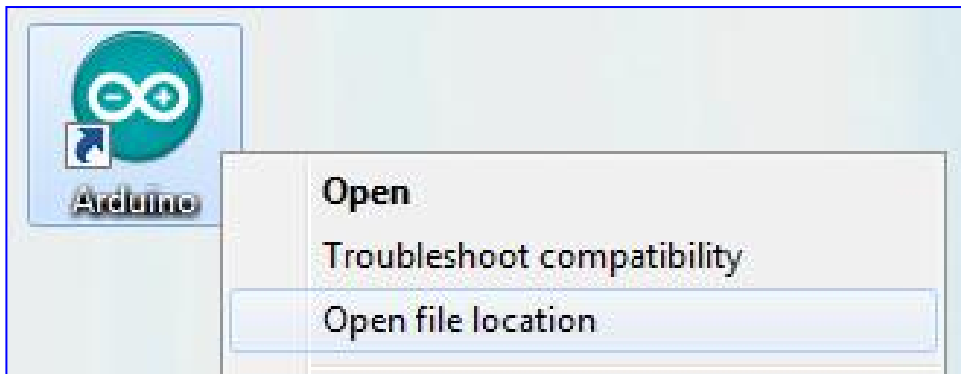

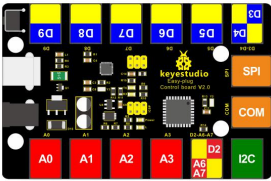
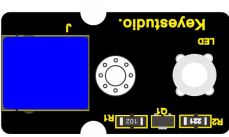

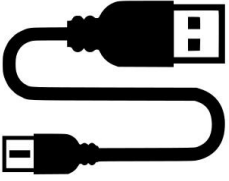
Project 1: LED Blink



1. Overview

The LED blinking project is the most basic Arduino project. In this project, we connect an LED to a digital pin and control it.

2. Component Required:

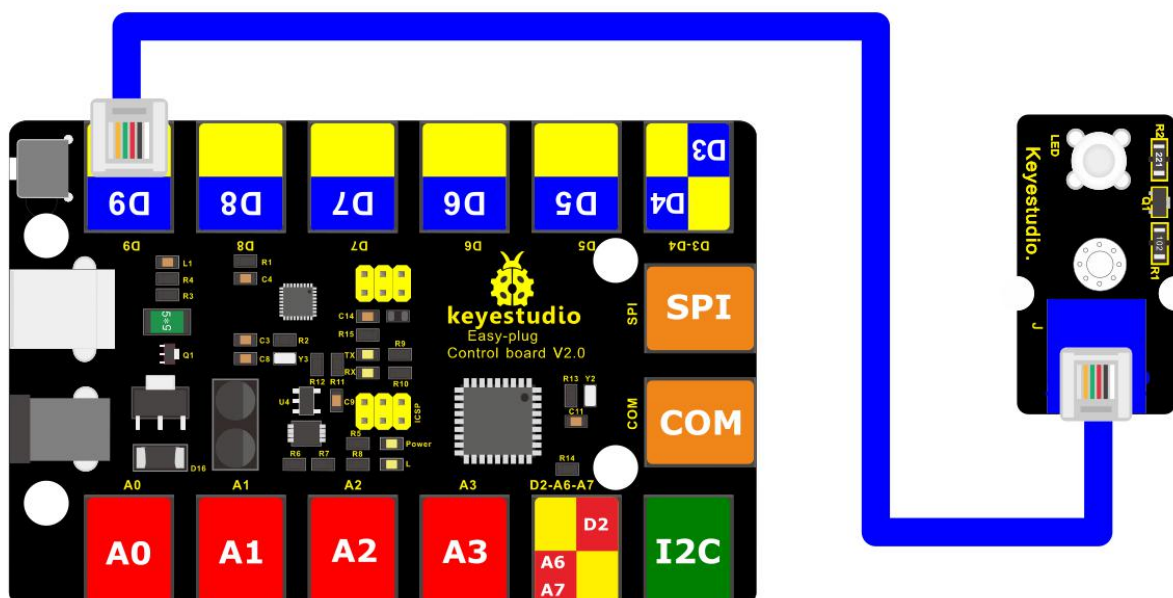
The LED light modules have shiny colors, ideal for Arduino starters. It can be easily connected to IO/Sensor shield.

Note: this module needs to be used together with EASY plug control board. You can also choose other LED to emit different color of light like blue, green, yellow and red.

- Sensor type: Digital
- Interface: Easy plug
- PH2.54 socket

4.Connect It Up

Connect the EASY Plug LED module to control board using an RJ11 cable.

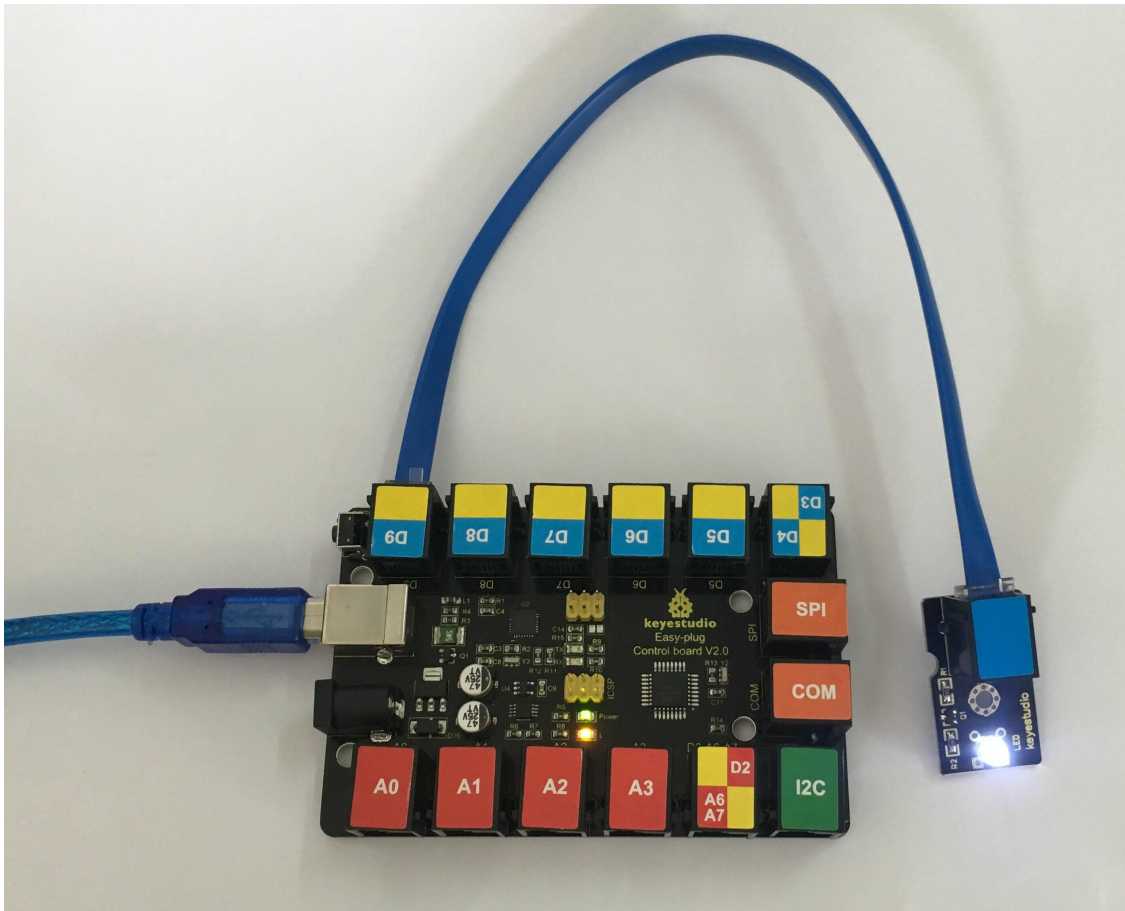

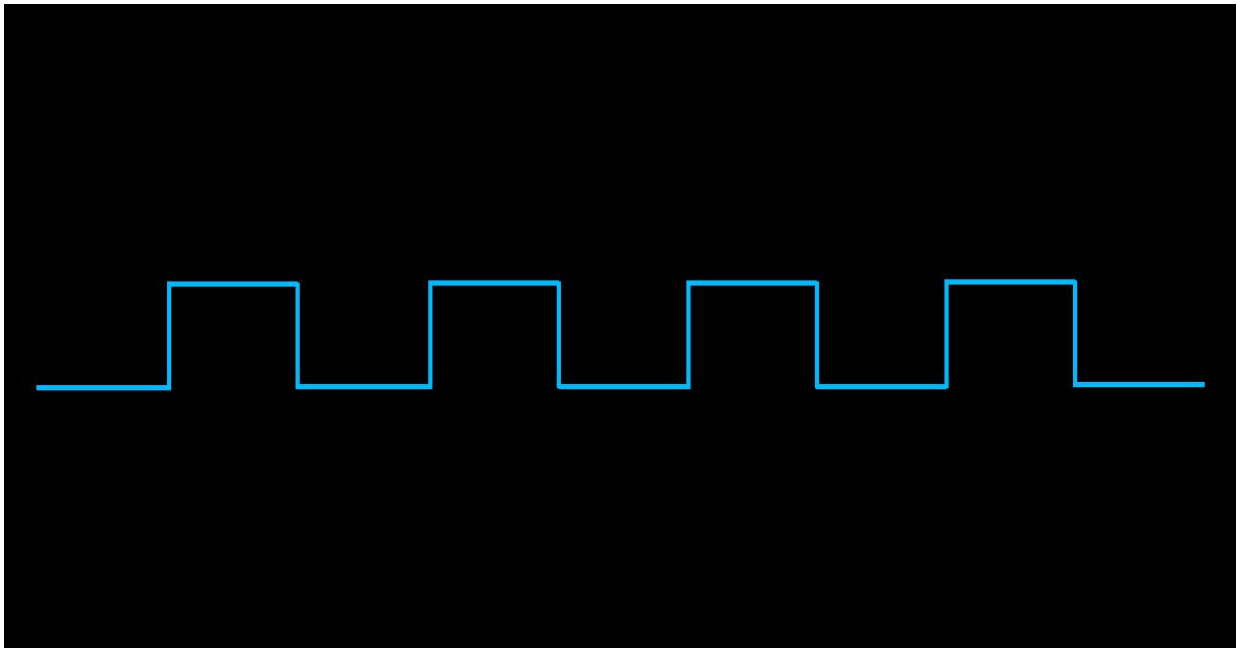

The LED will flash on for one second, then blink off for one second.

Project 2: PWM



1. Overview

LED blinking can be achieved through high and low levels, so how to control the

brightness of the LED? PWM technology is used to control the brightness of LEDs.

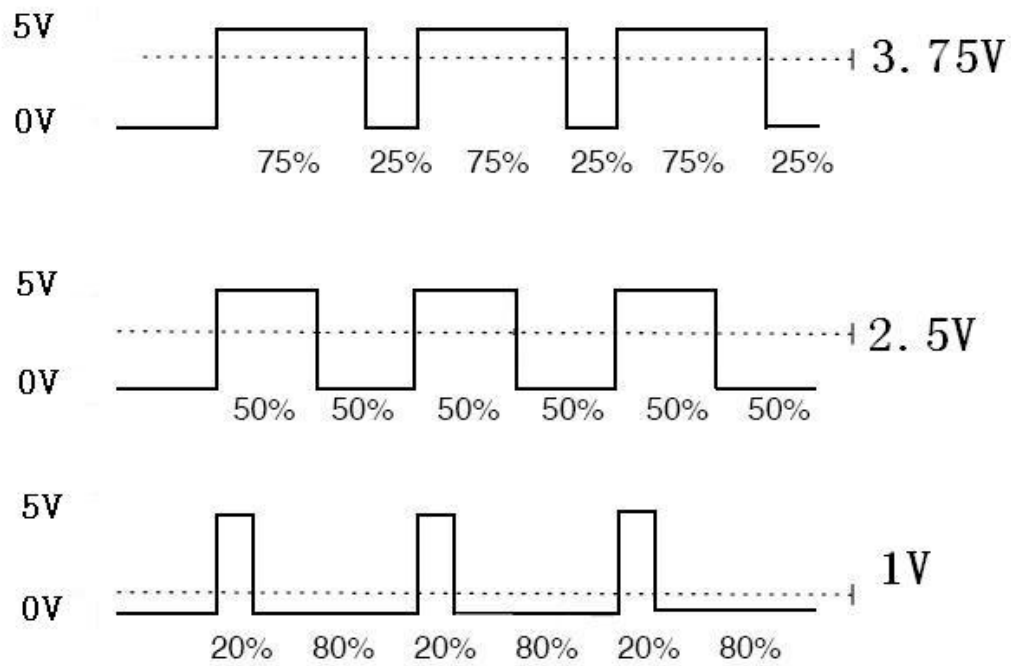
PWM, short for Pulse Width Modulation, is a technique used to encode analog signal level into digital ones.

A computer cannot output analog voltage but only digital voltage values such as 0V or 5V. So we use a high resolution counter to encode a specific analog signal level by modulating the duty cycle of PMW.

The PWM signal is also digitalized because in any given moment, fully on DC power supply is either 5V (ON), or 0V (OFF). The voltage or current is fed to the analog load (the device that uses the power) by repeated pulse sequence being ON or OFF. Being on, the current is fed to the load; being off, it's not.

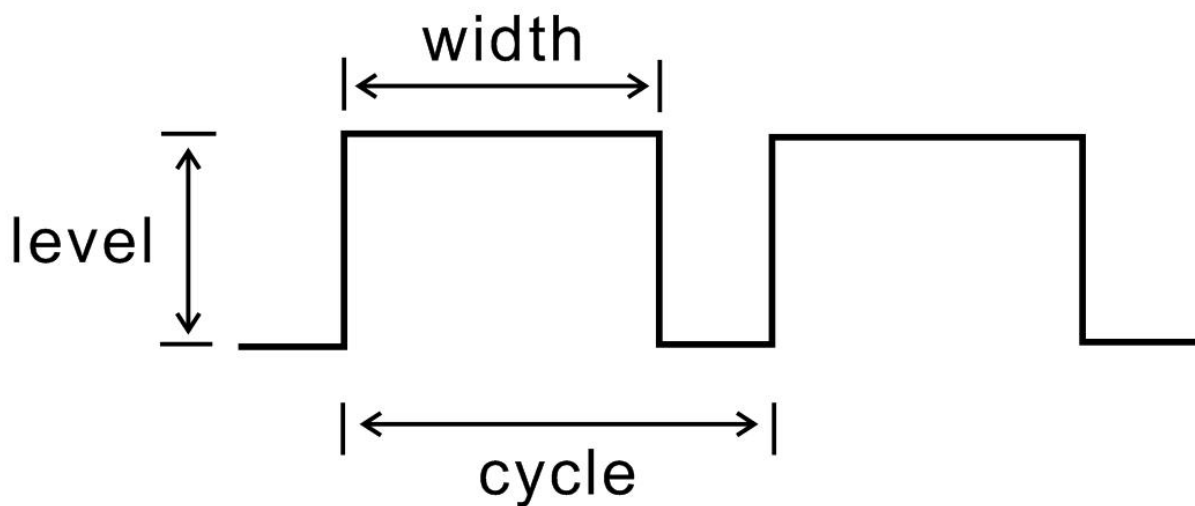
With adequate bandwidth, any analog value can be encoded using PWM. The output voltage value is calculated via the on and off time.

Output voltage = (turn on time/pulse time) * maximum voltage value

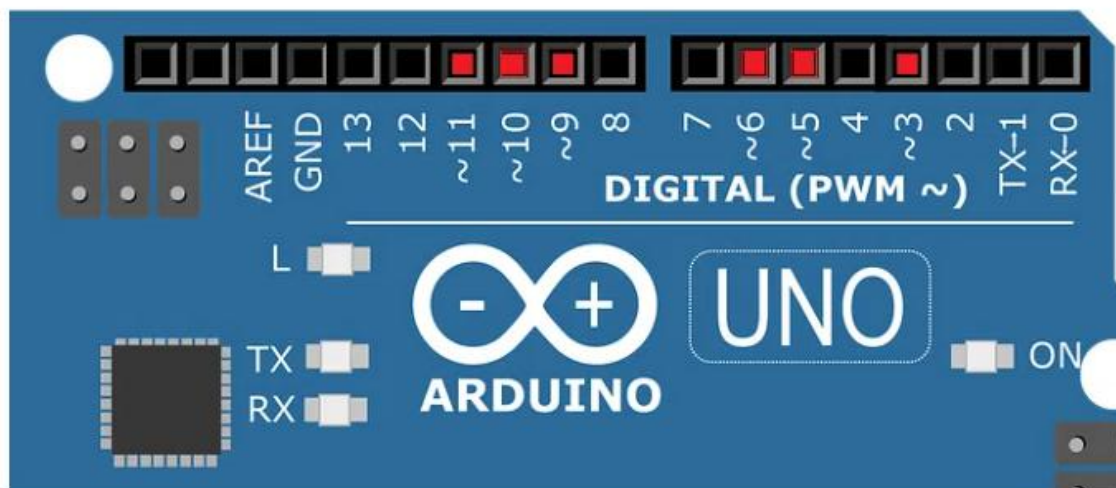


PWM has many applications: lamp brightness regulating, motor speed regulating, sound making, etc.

The following are the three basic parameters of PMW:



1. The amplitude of pulse width (minimum / maximum)
2. The pulse period (The reciprocal of pulse frequency in 1 second)
3. The voltage level (such as 0V-5V)



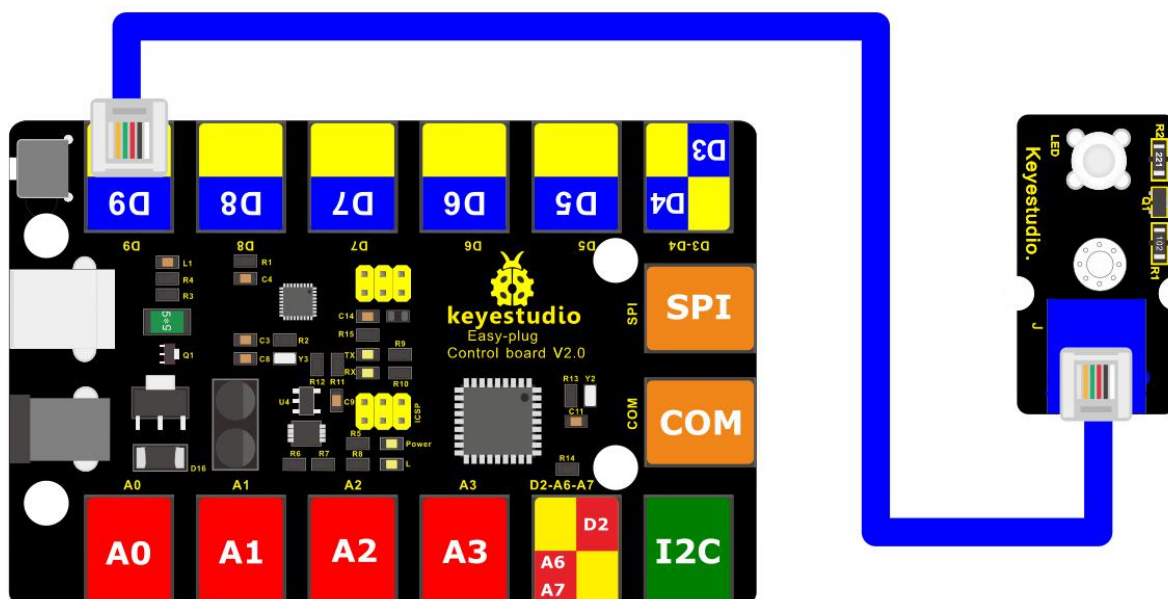

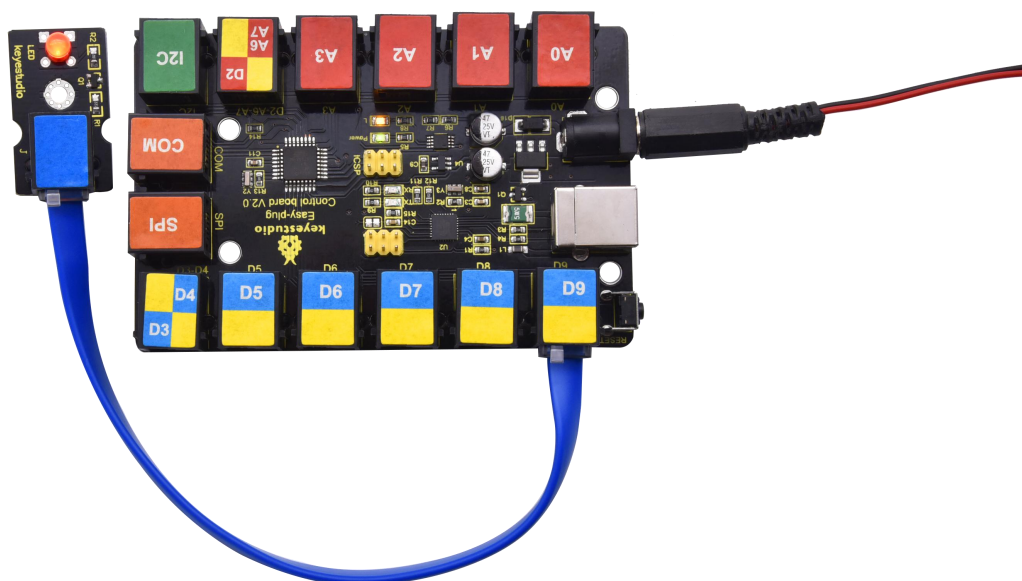

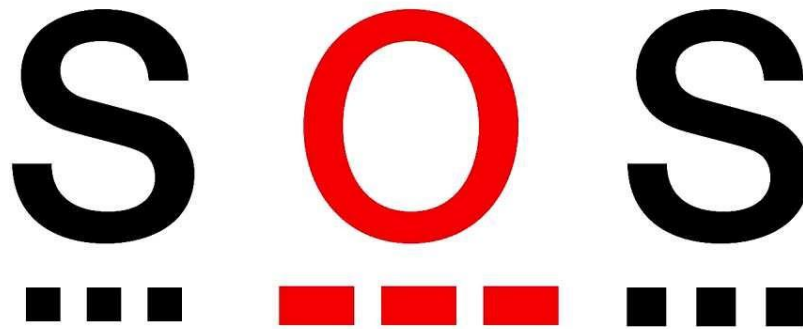

Project 3: SOS light



1. Overview

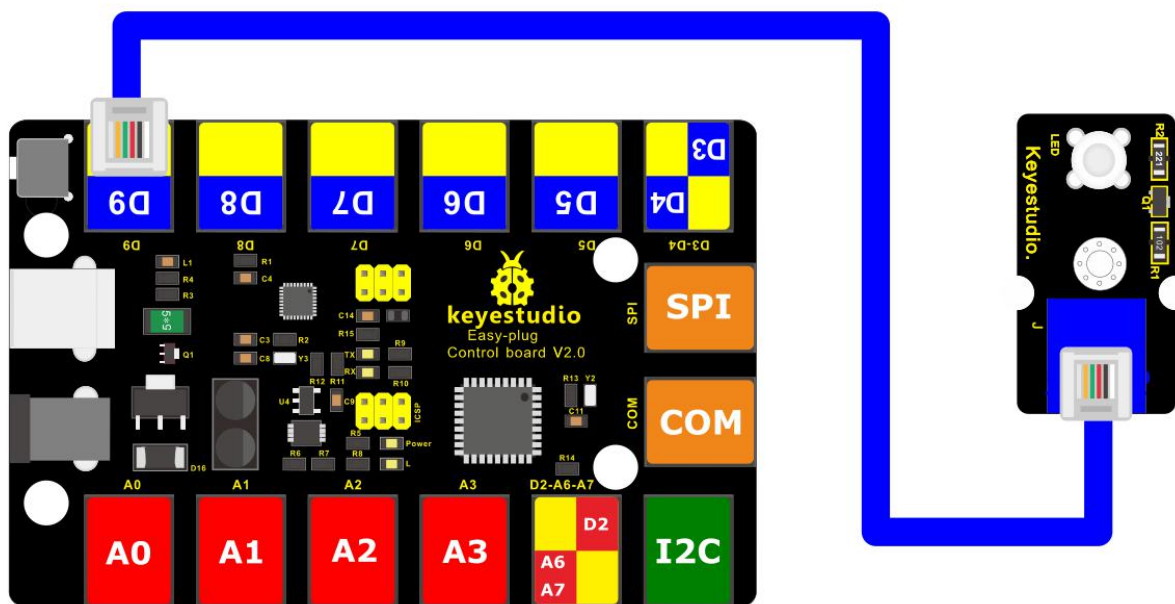
SOS is a Morse code distress signal, used internationally, that was originally established for maritime use. In formal notation SOS is written with an overscore line, to indicate that the Morse code equivalents for the individual letters of "SOS" are transmitted as an unbroken sequence of three dots / three dashes / three dots, with no spaces between the letters.[1] In International Morse Code three dots form the letter "S" and three dashes make the letter "O", so "S O S" became a common way to remember the order of the dots and dashes. (IWB, VZE, 3B, and V7 form equivalent sequences, but traditionally SOS is the easiest to remember.)

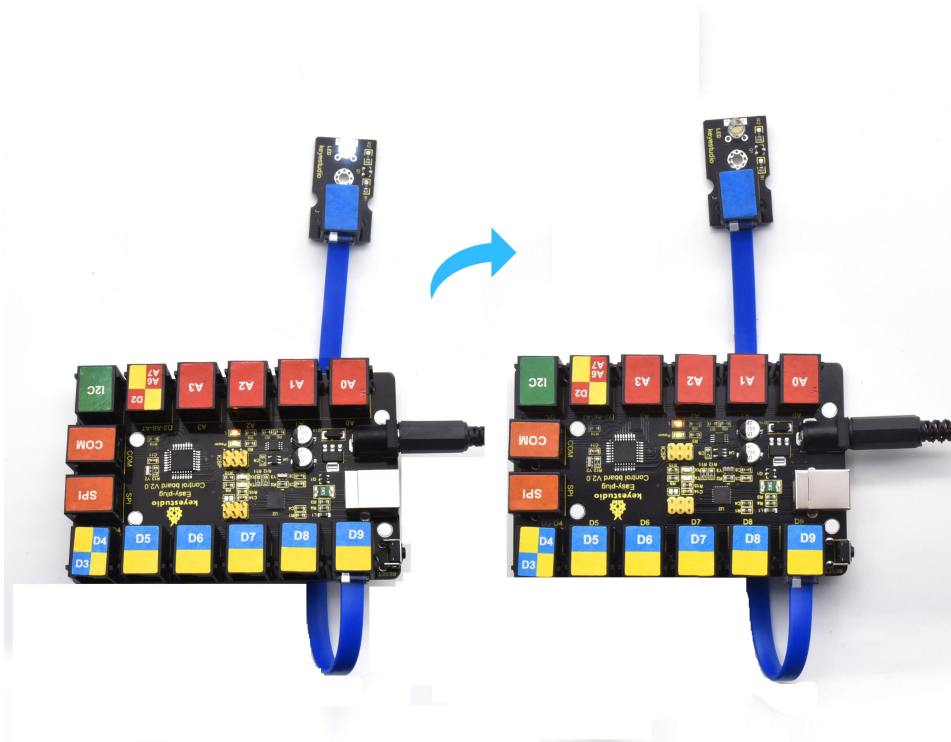

Upload code to Arduino, LED will show S.O.S signal, wait for 5s and show it again.

Plug external power in Arduino, and place them in a waterproof box, then S.O.S signal can be sent.

S.O.S signal is usually applied in maritime use and mountain-climbing.



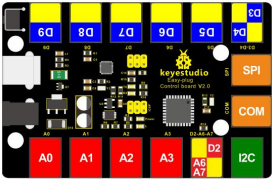
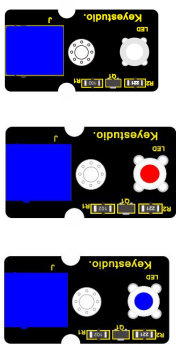
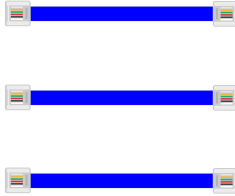
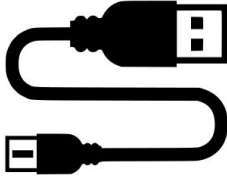

EASY plug Single Relay Module

This EASY Plug relay module uses a high-quality relay. A relay is basically an electrically controlled mechanical switch.

It is one of the most important controlled elements, which is widely used to control the lighting, communications, remote sensing,

electrical and other equipments.

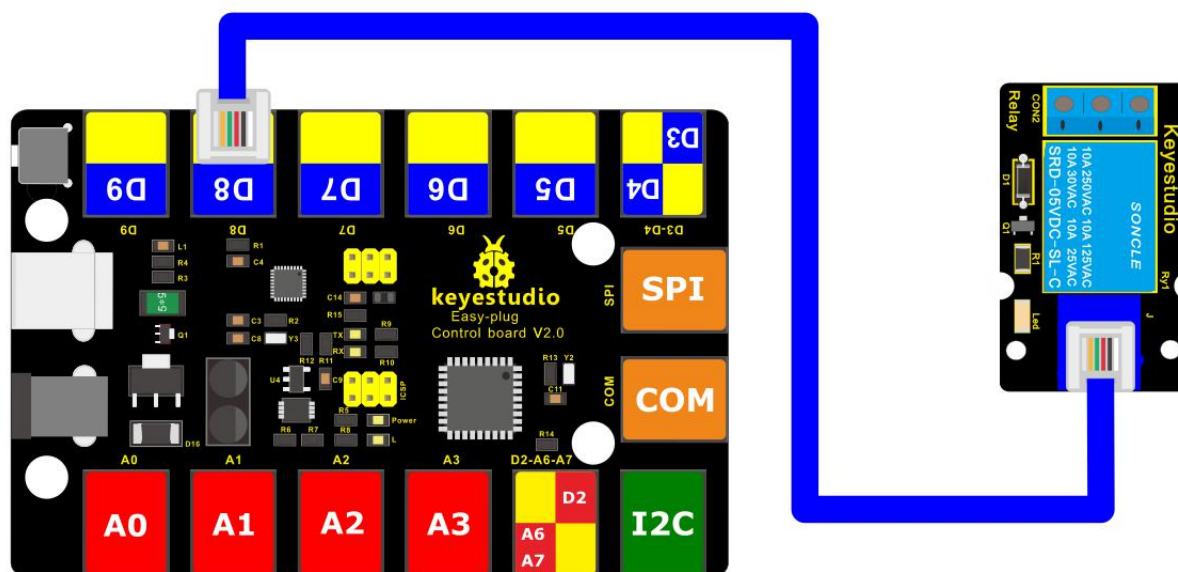
The Relay output state by a light-emitting diode, observing the relay ON and OFF status.

It can be controlled through the digital IO port, such as lamps, motors and other high current or high voltage devices.

The display principle of 8*8 dot matrix is very simple. We have seen the circuit diagram above to know that the single-chip microcomputer drives 8*8 dot matrix through the HT16K33 chip.

The arrangement of the dot matrix is as follows: 8 LED lights in the horizontal direction and 8 LED lights in the vertical direction. The total number of lights is 64. In order to quickly find the position of the light, we number the horizontal lights from 0-7, and the vertical lights from 0-7.
